## **Attentive Listening**

- Set the right atmosphere and mindset
- Does the patient need/want to talk?
- Be silent
- Encourage the patient to talk
- Describe what you're seeing or hearing rather than giving advice

## **Barriers to Communication**

Desire to maintain hope

Fear of not knowing the answer to questions

Fear of saying the wrong thing (eliciting a negative response)

Disagreement with patient or family decisions

Lack of understanding of culture or goals of care

Desire to avoid emotion

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
# Verbal & Non-Verbal Communication



80% of communication is nonverbal

- Body language
- Eye contact
- Gestures
- · Tone of voice

Exemplar: "Don't Try to Fix It, Just Listen"



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## Scenario #1:

An oncologist just told the patient that she has cancer and offered the option of treating the cancer or hospice care. The oncologist told the nurse that the patient would need additional support today after this difficult news. The nurse walks into the room...

#### It sounds like you may be feeling...

Sad

Scared

Frustrated

Overwhelmed

Frustrating

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## **Exploring**

- · What is on your mind?
- Tell me more...
- Can you help me understand what you mean when you say ["I don't want to give up...]?
- Can you tell me more about what [a miracle, fighting, not giving up, etc.] might look like for you?

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The doctor said he would give me medicine to keep me from throwing up.

I will give you those medications and will do everything that I can to keep you comfortable during your treatment.

Supporting

- "I wish" vs. "I'm sorry"
- "We will do our best to ensure you have what you need."
- "Our team is here to help you with this."
- > Continuing the supportive role through bedside nursing report

## Conversations must start with the **Patient**

- Assess Understanding (Ask Tell Ask)
- What worries you most?
- What is most important to you?



## Scenario #2:

The patient with heart failure came to the hospital with a high fever and was diagnosed with pneumonia. The cardiology team says that her heart failure is worsening despite all medical management. The nurse walks into the room...

ASK TELL ASK

## How to respond to...

"Is there any hope?"

Supporting: There are different things we hope for.

Exploring: Can you tell me what you hope for?

"I'm hoping for a miracle."

Supporting: I hope that for you too.

Exploring: Can you share what a miracle might look like to you?

A patient with severe lung disease has been struggling with dyspnea. She is planning to discharge to her daughter's home with hospice care. An hour ago, the patient was given a dose of oxycodone to treat her dyspnea. The nurse walks into the room...
